From the Senior Associate Rector : Adult Formation Programs

-year's upcoming Adult Formation programs. In looking at our offerings, I've organized them around a backbone of 3 tiers (Tier 1: CELC; Tier 2: CEE; Tier 3: EfM), each one moving deeper: deeper in knowledge, but more importantly, deeper in one's relationship with Christ and neighbor.

Tier 1, "Christian Essentials for Living in

Charlotte" (CELC) is highlighted at our Adult Forum (Sundays, 10:00am-11:00am, Parish Hall). Fall 2019sping 2020 will focus on the theme, "Getting to Know Charlotte Again for the First Time." Our communities and nation are struggling with many complex and interrelated issues, leaving us to wonder about the health of the communities in which we live. In doing so, we can look at community health through various lenses: political, physical, spiritual, racial, economic, health care access, housing and homelessness, family systems, sexuality, and on and on...all impacting one another, none standing alone. As St. John's discerns what God is calling us to do as we seek to serve God and one another in the Charlotte region, the first step in discernment is to understand those very communities in which we live. To that end, CELC this coming year will be filled with exciting opportunities to learn about what's happening in Charlotte: the challenges; hopes and dreams; struggles. We will be exploring a broad range of topics (by no means exhaustive) all intended to inform our reflections about what St. John's can engage in the name of Christ. Maybe we could start some new ministries from scratch; others might already exist in Charlotte, but call on us to join and support. The fall will begin with several officials from our city

reetings St. John's. I am very excited about this government who will help us at the 50,000 foot level. Thereafter, we'll move deeper into specific topics, periodically pausing in follow up sessions to openly reflect on what we've heard, to collectively debrief and discern how the Spirit is stirring our hearts, and to boldly respond with action, should the Spirit be calling St. John's to do so with the resources, gifts, and talents before us. Tier 2, "Christian Essential for

Episcopalians" (CEE) is a Wednesday night offering (6:30-8:00pm) for those who wish to deepen their understanding of the Episcopal tradition through which our Christian faith is expressed. While this is not a confirmation course per se, those who wish to be confirmed are to use this course to that end. Those who've already been confirmed are certainly invited to be part of this offering and to even consider being reconfirmed on the occasion of the Bishop's visit in late spring. CEE is organized, to help us go deeper: deeper in knowledge, but more importantly deeper in relationships with God and one another. Therefore, the group experience is at least as important as the content of the subjects presented. Therefore, this class will have a registration requirement and be limited to 15 participants per season. It is arranged around Matthew 22:37-39: "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your mind. This is the greatest and first commandment. And a second is like it: 'You shall love your neighbor as yourself." The fall will be a 10-week series of topics focused on Loving God. The spring will be a 10-week series on Loving Our Neighbor. For those wishing to be confirmed, they will be asked for a commitment to both semesters. For others, they are free to take either or both semesters, but are asked to commit fully to the entirety of the semester(s) for which they've registered. Again, the group experience and the building of relationships is key. It isn't about simply being informed, but being transformed through relationships with one another. If you are interested in this offering, the registration deadline is September 11. A waiting list will be arranged as necessary. Please contact Brad+. See the fall and spring schedule for CEE.

Tier 3, "Education for Ministry" (EfM) is a 4-year distance learning certificate program in theological education from Sewanee, based upon small-group study and practice. Since its founding in 1975, this international program has assisted more than 100,000 participants in discovering and nurturing their call to Christian service. EfM helps one encounter the breadth and depth of the Christian tradition and bring it into conversation with their experiences of the world as they study, worship, and engage in theological reflection together. We have had EfM at St. John's before and are embarking on efforts to bring it back as a resource to both members of St. John's and the Charlotte community. St. John's does not charge for this course but there is a fee to Sewanee. The current fee is \$475. Participants in groups under institutional sponsorship (such as St. John's) pay a discounted fee of \$375. The required texts are provided by Sewanee, additional reading materials suggested in the bibliographies. To assist students in need, a fee reduction provision is able on the basis of the total enrollment of the group. Scholarship funds are available from the EfM Alumni/ae Association Scholarship Fund.

Children's Formation: Times Are A-Changin'!

unday School for children is a staple in most churches, and St. John's is not an exception. For at least four decades, St. John's used a traditional Sunday School model to teach children from age four

through fifth grade. In this model, children are assigned into grade rooms in which they receive a weekly lesson about scripture, the church, or Christian life. This traditional approach worked very well for many years. Unfortunately, this model is faltering somewhat as family life evolves in the 21st century. With fewer families attending church on a weekly basis, with more dual-income families scheduling activities on the weekend, and with fewer parents attending Sunday offerings for themselves, the need for a new approach seems prudent.

To try and tackle some of these changes, St. John's is moving toward a Rotational Sunday School model. Rotational Sunday School is not a new concept; many churches use the rotational approach quite successfully. Nor is a rotational model completely foreign to St. John's. The Vacation Bible School

programs we offer are all based on a rotational design. In Rotational Sunday School, rather than teaching on a single lesson each week, the students spend three to six weeks learning about a given theme or topic. While the topic does not change, the students explore that topic

in a different way each week.

To illustrate how this model works, consider an example from a three-week session that St. John's did to test the rotational approach in the spring of 2018.

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At this time, St. John's is raising up mentors to be certified by EfM to organize and lead groups. Consequently, we anticipate rolling out EfM in the spring of 2020.

In addition, to these 3 tiers, we offer a plethora of other weekly opportunities that can be found in the "Groups" section of **Realm**: Book Club with Matt Williams, 3 Bible Studies, Lectio Divina (more groups to be added), Centering Prayer groups (with future workshops and retreats being organized), fellowship activities (ECW, Men's Ministry, Foyer Groups, Fly Fishing, Golf, T'ai Chi, Yoga), Daughters of the King, Intercessory Prayer Team, Monday Morning Prayer, Wednesday Evening Prayer, Labyrinth Keepers, and so many other opportunities.

If a person can't find something to link into, maybe that's a call to initiate something. Through Christ, in the Holy Spirit, let's dream big! The possibilities are limitless when we bring our faithful gifts and passions to the banquet table. 2 Corinthians 9:8: "God is able to provide you with every blessing in abundance, so that by always having enough of everything, you may share abundantly in every good work."

Choir Crescendo: Musical Opportunities and Offerings Increase

S everal exciting choir opportunities will be available this fall for singers of all ages. With the new schedule of church services beginning this fall, choirs will be singing anthems and actively leading the worship at the Sunday 8:45 a.m. service, Sunday 11:15 a.m. service, and monthly Evensong service.

8:45 a.m. Service Treble Youth and Shepherd Choirs

The Treble Youth Choir is made up of enthusiastic young people in the third-through-twelfth grades. Several spots are available because a number of Treble singers graduated this past spring. Rehearsals are held in the choir room on Wednesdays at 5:30 p.m.

The Shepherd Choir sings alongside the Treble Choir. Teens and adults in the Shepherd Choir provide alto, tenor, and bass voices to complement the Trebles. They rehearse with the Trebles at 6:30 p.m. on Wednesdays.

11:15 a.m. Service St. John's Choir

Adults and older teens make up the St. John's Choir. This group sings a variety of anthems in four-part harmony, ranging from early church music to classical. The choir also leads the congregation in hymns, songs during communion, and music that is part of the liturgy. Rehearsals are held in the choir room on Thursdays at 6:30 p.m.

Monthly Evensong Service

Members of the choirs are welcome to participate in Evensong services that rotate among St. John's, St. Martin's, and Holy Comforter churches. Choir members from all three churches join together in a combined choir once a month. The Evensong services provide a time of beautiful music and contemplative worship through song.

Parish Life Group Spotlight: Daughters Of The King (DOK)

ancy Nye, president of the St. Mary Magdalene Chapter of the Daughters of the King at St. John's, answers questions about the Order and the role they play at St. John's:

Why did St. John's establish a chapter of DOK? Chartered in 2015 as The St Mary Magdalene Chapter, 11 women of the parish desired to draw closer to God and to reflect His love to all whom they encountered. This community is a vibrant demonstration of the teachings of Jesus, through prayer, service and evangelism. Although organized as a religious order, Daughters do not live in an enclosed community; however, because of our vow, we refer to ourselves as an order, not an organization.

What are the goals of DOK within the St. John's community? Within the national and world community? The mission of the DOK is the extension of Christ's Kingdom through Prayer, Service and Evangelism, certainly within St. John's, and also wherever we go throughout the world. Empowered by the Holy Spirit, our vision is to make Him known to others, and to be reflections of God's love throughout the world.

How does the commitment and structure of the group support the group's goals? Each Daughter completes a 3 month discernment study before taking her vows and embracing a Rule of Life. Thereafter, her Rule of Life includes a 1) Rule of Daily Prayer, 2) Rule of Service, and 3) Rule of Evangelism. As Daughters, we realize that our faith is not to be a private faith hidden in our hearts, but a faith joyously proclaimed so that we may draw all to Him. Each monthly meeting includes sharing and reviewing prayer lists, reports and updates on service activities, both within St. John's and the larger Charlotte community.

How does the DOK support the goals of St. John's and the groups within the St. John's community?

1) Mission of the DOK: the extension of Christ's Kingdom through Prayer, Service, and Evangelism. St. John's Mission Statement: the mission of the church is to restore all people to unity with God and each other in Christ. We have DOK women involved as members and leaders in numerous <u>St. John's ministries</u> including: Habitat for Humanity, Hagar's Basket, Kanuga Kids at Camp Bob, Loaves & Fishes, Men's Shelter of Charlotte, Room In The Inn, Win Robinson Giving Tree (Merry Oaks Elementary School), Galilee



Ministries of East Charlotte, and Crisis Assistance Ministries. Daughters support our clergy with a small token of thanks on a monthly basis and provide a continental breakfast for clergy during all Easter Sunday services. Additionally, a Daughter serves on the Parish Health Team, other Daughters are Lay Eucharistic Visitors visiting the home-bound parishioners in continuing care communities. While the DOK is not allowed to raise funds for the Order, we do distribute funds from our DOK treasury to help support Hagar's Basket and Kanuga Kids.

How do the 3 guidelines of the group support the Daughters members to develop their faith? Simply, we are strengthened in our faith walk by the love and fellowship of other Daughters. This deepened faith is evident any time we gather together to put the teachings of Jesus into action by prayer, service, and evangelism. Romans 12:4-5 "Just as our bodies have many parts and each part has a special function, so it is with Christ's body. We are many parts of one body and we all belong to each other."

What should women do if they are curious about the group? Please join us at a monthly meeting and experience who we are and our unique intimacy. We open this community as a safe place where we share our faith stories, serve others, and grow in our knowledge and love for God and one another. Or, chat over a cup of coffee with any Daughter to learn more (all Daughters proudly wear a silver Fleury DOK cross, so we're easy to spot!). The <u>DOK website</u> offers loads of information including helpful introductory videos.

Endowment: St. John's Episcopal Church Endowment, Inc., a 501(c)(3) Entity

he Endowment was established to support and sustain the mission and activities of St. John's Episcopal Church and enable the church to more completely fulfill its mission by developing ministries beyond those possible through its annual operating budget.

What is a 501(c)(3) and Why does St. John's have one?

The St. John's Endowment Board thinks it's important and they have some good reasons.

First, St. John's has <u>current</u> needs that the Vestry manages and <u>long term</u> needs that the Endowment board supports financially. A 501(c)(3) helps separate the two groups and their responsibilities.

Second, when a person wants to give a planned gift for a specific purpose, it's helpful to know that a 501(c)(3)legal document is in place to assure that request will be honored, regardless of the passage of time and changing personnel.

Third, a 501(c)(3) requires an independent board with a fiduciary requirement to protect donated funds and

help them grow until they are needed to meet future needs.

Planned Giving can provide a donor some major tax savings and at the same time help St. John's meet its future needs. Tax consultants can guide donors through complex and changing tax regulations to accomplish specific objectives and St. John's can be the recipient of those efforts.

Through the committed and tireless leadership of Gary Williams and other St. John's leaders the difficult work was done to establish our 501(c)(3), which meets Internal Revenue Service (IRS) complex requirements and is now managed by the St. John's Endowment Board.

Now it is up to St. John's members to take advantage of our own 501(c)(3).

Hagar's Basket Spotlight: A Ministry That Supports Our Neighbors

agar's Basket was initially conceived as a wa to help reduce absenteeism in our local schools. Imagine a child having to go to school in dirty clothes, or without basic hygiene supplies like soap, deodorant, or toothpaste. Located downstairs in room 134, Hagar's Basket opened in September 2017. That first month we welcomed 6 families and almost two years later, we serve 146 families! Many of our families are referred to us by their schools, primarily Billingsville and Rama Road Elementary Schools and McClintock Middle School.

We welcome families on the <u>third Wednesday of each</u> <u>month between the hours of 1:00 and 5:00pm</u>. Each month, we receive your kindly donated items in our collection barrels to stock the shelves. To supplement your item donations, we shop for best buys using donated funds. In our first two years of providing for our families, we have distributed 1713 deodorants, 1799 bottles of laundry detergent, 1670 packs of toilet tissue and 1670 tubes of toothpaste!

attends Sunday School irregularly (once a month), they have the opportunity to be introduced to the theme/ topic that is being explored in an engaging way. For children attending on a regular basis (three or four times a month), the repeated theme and reinforcing workshops allow the child to really explore, learn, and apply the lesson. Some additional benefits of a rotational model include:

- Greater child interest in Sunday School because the model offers more variation in learning style and approach.
- Reduced lesson planning because teachers will lead one station for several weeks, simply adapting the plan for different age groups.
- Opportunities for more parents and adults to get involved since volunteers are only needed for a month at a time, rather than for a whole school year.

Beyond the change in teaching method, we are also planning a few other changes to make Sunday mornings easier for parents and more fun for children. These include:

- Introducing a single Sunday School drop-off/pickup point for all children: **Tilson Hall**.
- Adding music to our weekly Sunday School kickoff.
- Holding "bring a family member" Sundays, so children and adults can explore a lesson together on Sunday morning and continue to share it at home during the week.
- Conducting the workshops in locations throughout the church.

What can church women who are not yet members do to support DOK? Recognize that we women are all individuals, diverse in so many ways, and yet we are one community in Christ. Consider joining with other likeminded women and becoming a Daughter.

Are there other sister chapters of the DOK within the Charlotte area? How do these groups communicate with each other? St. Margaret's Episcopal Church in Waxhaw, NC, All Saints Episcopal in Concord, NC, and St Patrick's Episcopal in Mooresville, NC are active Chapters nearby St. John's. There are currently 25 Chapters in the Diocese of NC, and all are invited to the annual Fall and Spring Assembly Meetings held in various cities. The 2019 Fall Assembly will be hosted at St Margaret's. The Assembly offers Daughters the opportunity to meet one another, introduce new Chapters, exchange Chapter news and Diocesan financials, interact during a group workshop, share a delicious meal and conclude with the Eucharist.

What other information do you want women of the church to know about the DOK? We would want "No Woman Left Behind" at St. John's, because we are one body in Christ, each unique and important to the



whole. Consider joining us in our faith journey.
